Dear Church,

I grew up in a part of rural Minnesota that was surrounded with prairieland. In fact, one of the historic Laura Ingles Wilder *Little House on the Prairie* sites was on my drive to church. Prairies have a lot of grasses because they are sandy and lack trees like some ecosystems. I remember seeing devastating prairie fires as a kid. The fires would spread quickly in the wind and leave scorched earth behind in their wake. However, within days the ash would generally yield a bounty of new green growth. The ashes gave way to new life.

For the past couple of weeks I have been talking about the Bread of Life readings from John's Gospel. It has been challenging to a number of folks in our congregation because I have tried to connect the stories to our world today. In the first episode we heard about Jesus feeding 5,000 people without enough food to feed that many people. Somehow there was enough for everyone. That story was a challenge to our sense of scarcity and basic human needs. The second episode involved the people who Jesus fed in the first one. They came around him for more leftovers, but Jesus used the opportunity to challenge them about what it means to be hungry versus empty. He told them they would always get hungry, but their deep spiritual hunger could only be sated by the way of life he offered. Jesus challenged the people to choose a different path and to be open to the life he offered them. We talked about being challenged by differing viewpoints as a way of feeling deep fulfillment.

In the next episode, we heard that people were upset with Jesus for calling *himself* the "bread of life" that came down from heaven. This angered the people around him since it was as if he was making a mockery of their ancestral story of God sending "manna" (bread particles) down from heaven. This offended his religious community. They also knew his birth parents so they knew he didn't literally "come down from heaven." I tried to break down why it mattered that people seemed to disqualify what Jesus was saying because they knew his parentage. They weren't able to hear what Jesus had to say because they were fixated on how he offended their traditions *and* they knew his background. Like the folks in Jesus' community, some folks didn't quite hear what I intended to say, either – but focused instead on the illustration I used to explain how people talked about Jesus' family.

Something was said and meant one way, but it was heard and interpreted differently because of our strongly held convictions about customs.

In the fourth episode of the Bread of Life discourse, Jesus again reiterated that he is the bread of life come down from heaven. We heard that the people didn't complain about him saying this – they *argued*. They fought. Did this stop Jesus? No. He goes on to say he actually is the bread itself and his blood is the wine. If the people were upset about his interpretation of the manna story, they were probably even more offended by his interpretation of their Seder Meal custom (eating bread and drinking wine). Jesus knows what he says is challenging to people. He knows what he says sets ablaze the anger of those who are embroiled in tradition. He knows that what he says sets aflame the wrath of those who *know* his parents and his background. He knows that what he says is likely to cause a flare-up on a sensitive topic for them: customs and heritage. However, Jesus does not lob a bomb at his fellow persons of faith to destroy them. Jesus didn't leave behind an ash heap, but instead he left the people with new life and an alternative perspective from their own.

Jesus did not and I do not intend to preach on things or make illustrations during sermons as a way of leaving behind scorched earth. What would be the purpose of that? However, as Christians living in the 21<sup>st</sup> century we need to know what our options are for how to live out our faith in the world. Jesus addressed challenges and difficult subjects during his time. He challenged in order to make people wrestle with their own convictions and call into question whether they aligned with God's vision for the world – the Kingdom of God. He challenged in order to feed and nourish people. Like a prairie fire, a challenging example is not fatal. It may leave behind ash and fallout, but from that ash – new sprouts of life and growth shoot forth.

A couple months ago we celebrated Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost is the birthday of the Church. We remember how tongues of fire anointed the apostles' heads and how each of them was able to speak and understand different languages. The Spirit rested upon them as a fiery flame, but it did not burn them up. The image I used for Pentecost Sunday was an earth-fired chalice. I set it ablaze and it burned brightly with fire. Ever since that Sunday – the Sunday when I departed for 40 days of active duty military service, the chalice has sat upon the altar at the front of the church cold and full of ash. It's kind of sad because that isn't what a church is supposed to be like. It is my prayer that perhaps difficult conversations and topics can be a spark that ignites the chalice of our church again.

I need each of you to know that when I preach I try to be mindful of 200 people's points of view and beliefs. I try to be as even-handed as possible. Like the community back when Jesus was alive and preaching difficult lessons – we sometimes don't hear the intended message in the way that I meant. For that I am sorry. However, like Jesus, I will try to continue to challenge and help us grow. It is my prayer that we will not leave behind scorched earth when we teach, preach, and dialogue – but rather, new life. I look forward to the new life that this fall brings us at Christ Church as we continue to explore the Bread of Life discourse from John's Gospel. I hope you do too.

Dawa is 12 years old and lives in Lhaze Zong in Tibet. Both her father and mother are farmers. She has 2 sisters. Since Dawa's parents are poor they have sent all 3 siblings to the Upper Tibetan Children's Village (TCV) for an education.

The cost of sponsoring Dawa is \$45/month, or \$11.25/week. We hope to be able to sponsor her for a year with proceeds from our donut hour offering. We are encouraged to write to Dawa so she will know who is sponsoring her and that she may be able to write back to her "family" in the United States. The address to write to her is:
